



OUR YOUTH MINISTRIES GROW

Youth programming at St. Cons continues to grow! With more teachers and improved Sunday School curriculum, additional social and outreach activities for youth, the Lord has blessed our church's efforts in building our children's and youth programs. Planning is underway for our Fall programs, and we are looking for additional adult volunteers with an interest in working with children and teens. If you have interest and availability to help, please talk to Fr. Teodor or the church office.

With open arms, our church youth groups welcome any who are interested, and you'll quickly find your children are part of a loving community.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES: Pre-K – 8th grade Through Bible lessons, activities, crafts, media, music and games, children receive hands-on, age appropriate instruction in the teachings and traditions of our Orthodox faith. Classes begin Sunday, September 8th.

SUNDAY MORNING DISCUSSION GROUP: 9th – 12th grade Discussion group for High School students, continuing our Orthodox learning, and applying Orthodox values in daily life.

COLLEGE CONNECTION/OCF Our Moms' Group keeps in touch with young people attending college through "care package" mailings, email newsletters, and direct mail communications, to keep them connected to St. Cons parish life. The Orthodox Christian Fellowship is the official collegiate campus ministry program charged with connecting Orthodox college students to Christ and His Church. (<http://www.ocf.net/>)

H.O.P.E & J.O.Y. Children, ages 4 – 12 and their families come together after church for lunch and activities. These programs encourage each child to interact in a safe, relaxed, casual setting and learn about our faith while having fun!

G.O.Y.A. GOYA (Greek Orthodox Youth of America) is the ministry to teenagers 7th through 12th grades. Throughout the program year, youth participate in social and community events, service projects, volunteerism, and outreach projects. While involved in GOYA, our young people make friendships that last a lifetime.

ALTAR BOYS/EPISTLE READERS Young men, grades three and up, assist the clergy as Altar boys during the Divine Liturgy and other services. Altar boys must make a commitment to arrive to church on time, and attend church regularly. Every other Sunday, one of our teen volunteers reads the Epistle in English during the service. Serving during Liturgy increases a young person's self-confidence and sense of responsibility, along with their knowledge of our faith.

Life can be hectic, and parents sometimes find it challenging just to make it to Sunday service. If you start consistently taking your children to church when they're young, they will forever learn the good habits of church attendance. Positive childhood experiences with parish activities give our young people the knowledge that church is a safe and welcoming place. For the rest of their lives, they'll benefit from their Orthodox faith, values and church community.

A Message from Father Teodor



On August 15 we celebrate the great feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos, preceded by 14 days of fasting. For each of us it is hard to get close to the holiness which the Theotokos achieved in her life. Such was her humility and devotion to the will of God that she earned the title of “All Holy” or “Panagia.”

It is indeed a difficult thing to follow the path of God. The reason for this is quite simple—we love ourselves more than we love God. All too often our desires stand opposed to the will of God. The freedom that God gives us allows us to go away from the path which we were intended to take. God forces no one to follow Him. Deep down inside we are aware of our own wrongdoings but nevertheless we make excuses which permit us to oppose God. We get into the habit of absolving ourselves of our sins. When our hypocrisy becomes self-evident, we leave the church, finding excuses for that decision as well.

There are too many examples of such vanity. We are called to love our enemies, but we may even have difficulty loving our family and friends. We are called to love God with all our heart, mind, and soul but struggle to fit church into our busy schedules. We are called to follow Him and yet the ways of the world are far more attractive.

This August, however, Panagia stands before us as proof that it can be done—that we can follow God with grace and humility. The feast day of her Dormition shows that as difficult as it is to follow God in this world the challenge is even greater when we are faced with the prospect of leaving it. At life’s end our fears and our doubts come to the surface. The dignity and calm of the Virgin Mary at the moment of her Dormition were no different from the same qualities she showed on Annunciation.

She simply accepted the will of God, whatever that might be.

Some might call such dedication to God “blind obedience” but the Christian calls it “unconditional love.” Too often we demand unconditional love from our parents, our brothers and sisters, our friends and ultimately from our God but we are unwilling to give it. The faith, the dignity, the resolve, the humility, and the grace of the Theotokos were all born out of her great capacity to love.

Panagia obeyed God because she loved Him and she endured all because she loved us.

We are called this August, in this season of the Dormition of the Theotokos, to reflect upon the true love for God and humanity which the Mother of God possessed. Only love of God allowed her to follow His will. Only love of God allowed her to endure seeing her Son and God hang upon the Cross. Only love of God allowed her to face her own earthly mortality with a dignity that encouraged the Apostles in their ministry. It is this same love to which we appeal at every Paraklesis when we ask Panagia to intercede on our behalf before her Son.

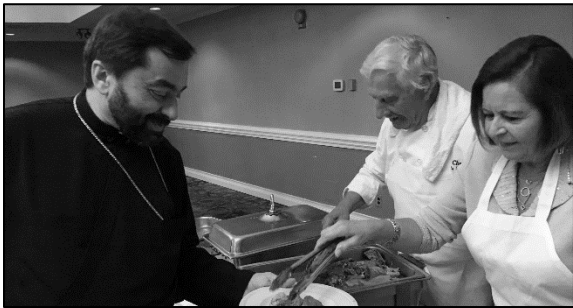
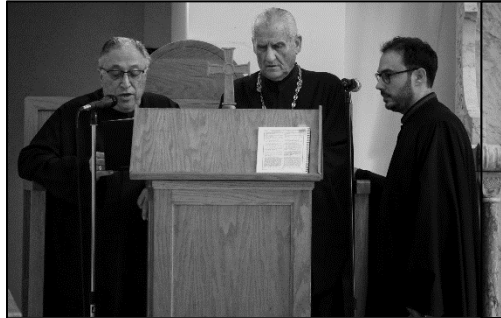
This is the way we should be. We are all called to follow that example, for in doing so to love God with all our mind and soul we ultimately learn how to love others and how to love ourselves.

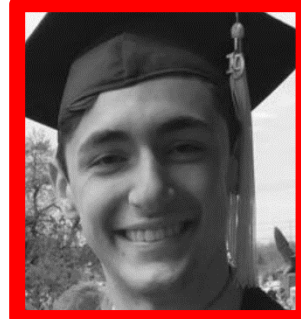
